

Bergson And Phenomenology

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Edmund Husserl (1859-1938) was born in a Jewish family on April 8, 1859, in Prostejov, a small town in Tszechoslovakia between Prague and Vienna.

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Often neglected as an influence on phenomenology, Bergson's thought has resurfaced and brought challenges to phenomenology.
